

### **EDUCATION, PRESERVATION & ADVOCACY**

2021 saw the Heritage Foundation's Preservation, Education and Advocacy department grow its profile nationally, while expanding its offerings locally in an ongoing effort to engage and inform generations of historic preservationists, new and old, near and far.



The **4th Annual Preservation Symposium** brought nationally known speakers to discuss "Revitalizing Preservation: See History, See Potential," including Brent Leggs of the African American Cultural Heritage Fund, and Danielle Del Sol of the Preservation Center of New Orleans. The Symposium

hosted our annual Preservation Awards where we honor projects and individuals who made significant contributions within the field of historic preservation.

**2021 Preservation Award Winners** include: The City of Brentwood Historic Commission Preservation as an Advocacy Award Honoree; Harpeth Square Mixed-Use Development for Excellence in Infill; the Downtown Franklin Rotary Club Headstone Cleaning Project for Excellence in Preservation, and The David McEwen House for Excellence in Preservation Through Restoration.

Local educators had the opportunity to sharpen their pedagogical chops at our **1st Annual Summer Educator Institute** in June. This immersive professional development program provides social studies teachers a chance to engage with nationally recognized scholars in research and critical analysis, while helping them make history come to life for students.

### EDUCATION, PRESERVATION & ADVOCACY (CONT'D)

### Warwick Lecture Series

2021 continued the beloved educational Warwick Lecture Series. **Rick Warwick** himself drew the year's largest turnout with 300 attendees at The Franklin Theatre for "Faces of Our Past." Other notable guest speakers included **Colin Woodward**, **PhD**, delving into the roots of Johnny Cash, **Dr. Ashley Bouknight-Claybrooks** discussing the interpretation of American slavery at historical sites, and **Dr. Marquita Reed-Wright** of the National Museum of African American Music.

### In the Community

We conducted numerous **historic site visits and fieldwork** including the Caney Fork Iron Furnace (Fairview), Ebenezer Methodist Church (Nolensville), the Hardeman Cabin (Triune), Preservation Park (Thompson's Station), Patton/McCord Cemetery (Arrington), and more. Beyond local impact, the department's expertise contributed to the national historic preservation conversation via **local meetings and national conference presentations**.

Extending education directly into local classrooms, we unveiled the first online teacher and student resource to complement our **Rosenwald/African American education panels**. We also curated our first traveling interpretive panel exhibit on **Women Suffrage and the 19th Amendment** (14,000 students) and the Williamson County Archives (10,000 visitors).

### Advocacy

A new **Sites to Save** initiative put a spotlight on endangered historic places in the county. 2021's list included one National Historic Landmark, four National Register of Historic Places, and one cemetery. We also established the first **Preservation Advocacy Committee** which met quarterly to discuss the prioritization of advocacy areas.

Furthermore, two historic Brentwood properties directly benefited from our intervention in 2021: the **Owen-Primm House** found its way into the hands of a preservation-minded buyer, and the **Holly Tree Gap Farm** received a reprieve from a utility company's plan to seize portions of the historic property, including a condemnation lawsuit.

### **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

The Heritage Foundation continued its efforts to engage donors, volunteers, sponsors, and the public by creating avenues for them to give their time and resources to the cause of historic preservation, the performing arts, and community building.

The second half of the year welcomed the return of in-person events and the chance to reunite together. In addition to hosting volunteers and members at our VIP tent at all three festivals, donors and sponsors networked at the **Patron's Party** held at Old Town, the home of Senator Bill and Tracy Frist. Vanderbilt Health sponsored an elegant, outdoor-themed **48th Annual Heritage Ball presented by Vanderbilt Health** chaired by Dr. Allen Sills and Mrs. Shawne Sills. The Franklin Theatre also hosted a sprawling summertime **10th Anniversary sponsored by Jackson**<sup>®</sup> on Main Street, with elegant lounges outside the theatre and dazzling performances on the stage to herald ten years since the theatre's reopening.

In the world of community advocates, both **Next Gen** and **Jr. Heritage** membership groups raised funds for the cause and continued to develop emerging generations of philanthropists and preservationists. Next Gen hosted the Late Party tied to the Heritage Ball and brought the exuberance of young professionals to the festivities. Jr. Heritage held their first "Jail & Bail" fundraiser during PumpkinFest<sup>™</sup>, "locking up" select volunteers at the Old, Old Jail to spark donations for their freedom. In one day, they raised \$10,000 – a remarkable display of creativity and fun mixed with a mild threat of incarceration.

The team further worked to help create informative content for member-exclusive emails and launched appeal campaigns which received gracious generosity from the donor community.

### DOWNTOWN FRANKLIN ASSOCIATION

The Downtown Franklin Association (DFA) saw unprecedented growth following one of the most challenging economic years in history. With revitalized member programming and communications including member recruiting and retention strategies and systems, the membership base grew to an impressive 120+ members. The DFA worked with local, county, and state leaders to research ways to relieve the higher taxes building owners are paying after the 2021 reappraisal, renewing a commitment to reengaging downtown building owners to help them understand the importance of keeping downtown local.

In addition to nurturing the local economic sector, the DFA expanded its reach by invigorating its communications and promotions strategies. Not only did it rebrand and develop new marketing assets, but it also revamped its promotions to feature more member businesses, highlighting the history and design elements of downtown architecture in a more cohesive and comprehensive storytelling approach. It also leveraged the website as a resource for consumers by refreshing online businesses listings to reflect membership, updating the online calendar, creating an online downtown job bank. With these initiatives, the division rapidly expanded its social media reach, nearing 100,000 followers across Instagram, Facebook, and email subscribers.

### **FESTIVALS**

The return of the beloved downtown festivals brought record numbers to downtown Franklin while contributing an estimated \$8.26 million to the local economy. The DFA also creatively devised options to increase foot traffic and commerce in the brick-and-mortar businesses that border the yearly event vendors, such as Trick or Treat Trail at PumpkinFest™ and Candy Cane Lane at the Dickens of a Christmas festival. Festival planning rose to a new level of expertise as we utilized architect and design software to create an accurate, toscale measurement of the entire downtown Franklin festival footprint. Public safety also took priority as the team worked with the City of Franklin to create and institute a Festival Incident Action plan.

Though the annual spring **Main Street Festival sponsored by First Horizon** had to be postponed to July, it boasted the most well-attended numbers for the event in recent history with 125,000 attendees. October ushered in the most curated and designed **PumpkinFest™ sponsored by FirstBank** in recent history, exceeding budget projections. Following closely on the heels of the recent PumpkinFest™ success, the annual **Dickens of a Christmas sponsored by First Citizens National Bank** – despite inclement weather that forced the cancelation of one festival day – still broke a one-day attendance record and contributed an impressive overall economic impact of nearly \$2.5 million to downtown commerce.

In conjunction with the preservation team, the DFA used the festivals to capitalize on awareness and understanding of Heritage Foundation properties by having Haunted Tours at the Old, Old Jail for PumpkinFest<sup>™</sup> and a curated Christmas Carol experience at Franklin Grove Estate & Gardens for Dickens of a Christmas.

### THE FRANKLIN THEATRE

After having to close for six months in 2020, The Franklin Theatre came roaring back with vitality and renewal for the 10th Anniversary of the Theatre's restoration and reopening by the Heritage Foundation. Its phased approach found creative solutions to pandemic problems in the first quarter, offering unique programming such as private screenings and rentals, Pay-What-You-Can Movie options, and a successful Marguee Message donation campaign.

We unveiled the theatre's much-anticipated mini-documentary, "The Jewel of Main Street" and heralded a milestone by taking over Main Street with a show-stopping 10th Anniversary Celebration sponsored by Jackson<sup>®</sup> in August that reunited and connected our community. Despite limited programming from January to June, the theatre impressively sold nearly **31,000 tickets**, held **170 concerts**, performing arts programs and other events (including FT Live and Great Performances sponsored by Jackson®), showed 146 film screenings, and we proudly furthered our mission of diversifying our performance offerings to meet the expanding needs and interests of the entire community.

Despite the challenges 2021 presented, we not only served as an economic catalyst for neighboring downtown Franklin businesses but also gave generously as an organization. The theatre remained true to its nonprofit roots by providing a platform for philanthropy and education, serving over 40 nonprofit organizations and local schools, as well as providing more than \$45,000 in-kind donations for other nonprofits.

### FRANKLIN GROVE ESTATE & GARDENS

The plans for the Heritage Foundation's newest historic adaptive reuse project, Franklin Grove Estate & Gardens, took root and bloomed in 2021. With the completed restoration of the **LeHew Mansion**, the newly-created Franklin Innovation Center in partnership with Williamson, Inc. – an incubator for small businesses and entrepreneurship – celebrated its grand opening in June. The project's overall **Master Site Plan** began the formal City of Franklin process to rezone and develop the site. In conjunction with a major community outreach effort to solicit feedback, we consulted with the Historic Zoning Design Review Committee and continued ongoing work with architects, engineers, and city staff to further refine the development plan.

We also gained a greater and deeper understanding of the site and its history this year. The preservation team spearheaded its first **archaeological study** on the site with one of the nation's leading experts using ground-penetrating radar to search for artifacts in the rear yard, funded by a \$30,000 grant from the Tennessee State Wars Commission.

Efforts to gain advocacy for the project were supported with the launch of a group called **Franklin Grove Ambassadors**. The preservation and education team also conducted site tours with Symposium attendees along with creatively activating the campus during Dickens of a Christmas; attendees lined up to travel back in time to Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol* as they toured the Perkins-Winstead Mansion with our costumed team and volunteers.



## Financials

The Heritage Foundation's consolidated operating revenue, including its Franklin Theatre, Downtown Franklin Association, and Franklin Grove divisions totaled \$4.51 million for the year January 1, 2021 to December 31, 2021. Expenses for the same period totaled \$4.5 million with a net profit of \$3,005. Despite the global pandemic, the ability to balance our budget for 2021 allowed us to remain in a strong financial position heading into 2022.


